# Nursing home receives top award

News nuggets and coffeeshop chatter from Paducah and the area.

Superior Care Home Nursing and Rehabilitation Center has received the Kentucky Initiative for Quality Nursing Home Standards' Best Practices Award.

Nancy Trentham, a board member for the Cold Springbased independent citizens-advocacy organization known as KYIQ, presented the award Tuesday at Superior. The honor recognizes exemplary practices that are a model for other nursing homes to adopt to enhance quality of care. Criteria include low staff turnover and high staff-patient ratios.

The advocacy group and Kentucky State Long Term Care Ombudsman Program have started a pilot program in which nursing homes help mentor one another with best practices to improve the industry overall.

Mary Ellen Thompson founded Superior in 1972. Her daughter, Helen Sims, and grandson, Michael Sims, now operate the center, twice named the Kentucky Association of Health Care Facilities' Facility of the Year.

President Barack Obama has nominated David Mi**chaels** — who launched an investigation of historical safety and health practices at the Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant — to lead the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

"He told me he believes confirmation will take place in the next two to three

weeks," said Todd Nelson, president of United Steelworkers Local 550, the plant's primary labor union. "His contributions to the community have been huge, and from what I've learned about him I think he'd get a great asset to OSHA."

Michaels, former DOE assistant secretary for environment, safety and health, helped get federal funding for the Early Lung Detection Program, which Nelson said has saved many lives among nuclear workers at Paducah and elsewhere. Michaels also was a chief writer of the Energy Employees Occupation Illness Compensation Program, which has paid more than \$500 million to sick current and former Paducah plant workers and their fami-

Nelson said Michaels would bring management and workers together to change the culture on workplace safety, and his emphasis on sound science would lead to common-sense deci-

Michaels is now a research professor and occupational health authority at George Washington University School of Public Health.



#### **SINGH:** Owner backs out of deal to sell Executive Inn for \$300,000

against Singh and the hotel. Logan wants to sell the hotel to recover its mortgage, while the convention board claims ownership without cost, contending the hotel has been abandoned and is on its property.

Judge Jeff Hines will hold a hearing Friday on motions for summary judgments.

Logan negotiated with Singh for several months, according to court documents filed Tuesday.

"The reason there were negotiations with Mr. Singh was to avoid litigation and get title to the hotel so we could do upkeep and market it for sale," said Farmer, adding that the litigation could take a year or more. "The offer was generous. I don't know why he didn't

Singh lives in California and has not returned telephone messages seeking comment.

take it."

The court documents include details of the agreement in principle.

Singh would be paid \$300,000 and cleared of his responsibility to pay the \$3.5 million mortgage, \$400,000 in liens and past-due taxes of nearly \$100,000.

In addition, if Logan sold the hotel for more than the

mortgage, debts and related expenses, Singh would receive 50 percent of the ex-

Documents indicate that Singh at one point agreed to the offer.

"I will accept \$300,000" and other conditions that had been agreed to in writing and e-mail messages, Singh said in the June 19 email message.

"I will have my legal counsel arrange a conference telephone call so that we can discuss the definitive terms of our settlement and the balance of the other matters which will need to be addressed in order to complete this matter," Singh said.

No documents detail the outcome of the negotiations, but Farmer said they couldn't come to an agreement.

At the same time it was negotiating with Singh, Logan was negotiating to sell the hotel to the city for \$4.3 million, according to court documents.

City Attorney David Denton said there were no negotiations because there were other issues that needed to be resolved.


